Never lose Hope in God's mercy. This sentence describes, in a nutshell, the foundations of religious life, as well as Christian life: if there is anything by which we attract and hold

fast to God's protection, it is the trust we have in his mercy. All those whom he has brought together by the guidance of his Holy Spirit and for the glory of his Name must Hope in him, for he alone is the unity and consolation of the saints.

The Superior is the man through whom God shares his graces with all his brothers; he is a basin that is filled, and then distributes the water he has received. And since he must depend

on the generosity of Jesus Christ for the bread he is to break for those whose Shepherd and Father he has been appointed to be, neither must he cease to ask the Lord for this



grace in order to obtain it. Prayer is the pre-requisite: without it, God will have no regard for our needs.


